Sherbrooke Church
Glasgow
Christmas 1914

My Dear Sir

As one of those who at this National Crisis have gone out from our congregation on the Service of King and Country, we the undersigned would beg in the name of Sherbrooke Church to send you at this Christmastide our loving greeting and good wishes for the coming year.

We honour you for the noble step you have taken and as a small token of our admiration for your courage and self-sacrifice, we would ask you to accept these accompanying gifts. They may serve to remind you that in the words of our king, "We follow you in our daily thoughts on your certain road to victory".

You are fighting for principles that have long been held sacred in our history, the principles of righteousness, liberty and humanity. We know that in that conflict you will "quit yourself like men". Our only prayer is that you may be preserved from the perils of your life and be spared to return home crowned with the glory of a triumphant vindication of the Nation's Cause.

"The eternal God is your refuge; and underneath are the everlasting arms".

May God's blessing rest on you throughout the coming year.
