I enrolled at Glasgow University as a mature student on an Access Course to gain qualifications to allow me to become a full time divinity student.

After university I was the probationer at Montrose Old Church with the Rev Laurence Whitley.

My first charge was Belhelvie Church in the Gordon Presbytery, that was followed by East Kilbride Old and my final charge was Lenzie Old.

During my ministry I was Prison Chaplain at Craiginches Prison in Aberdeen also 18 years as Prison Chaplain in Barlinnie Prison.

Since retiring I have been the Locum at Cadder Bishopbriggs Church, St David's Memorial Park Church in Kirkintilloch and for the past few years, during the summer months Locum on Islay.

I am looking forward to being Locum Minister at Sherbrooke Mosspark Church.

We have also lived through the end of an era with Tom's retirement after 18 years with Sherbrooke Mosspark. We wished him a fond farewell last Sunday 25th April - there are lots of lovely photos of the event including the various gifts presented to Tom, Elaine and Neil on the website. It was a lovely day and we enjoyed fellowship with the Pollock family as they start a new chapter in their lives. Thank you to everyone for providing such a splendid 'send off' to Tom. Special thanks though must go to Julian Guse for organising the presents for the whole family, including the fantastic hoodie and baseball cap for Neil. The music composition gift from Grace Guse was very special which you can hear on the church service recording. Two beautifully prepared flower arrangements, courtesy of the flower committee, were also presented to Elaine and Mairi.

We are now being 'looked after' by Mark Johnstone, our interim moderator and Douglas Clark, our Locum Minister. Many of you had the opportunity to meet Mark when he came to preach on Sunday 11th April and Elders have joined the Kirk Sessions which have been held over the past month (I think there have been 3, 2 of which Mark has chaired). Mark will continue to be involved in the 'business side' of church matters - chairing Kirk Session meetings, playing an integral role in the vacancy process and supporting Douglas and me. Douglas Clark has been appointed as our Locum Minister; he will conduct our Sunday services and provide pastoral care for our church community over two days each week. Please contact either me, Mark Johnstone or Douglas Clark for any pastoral areas during the coming months. Janis Walker, our church administrator, is continuing her sterling work and please continue to contact her for any office related matters.

The vacancy process has got off to a good start. We elected 13 members to our nominating committee who have already had two meetings during April. Garry Borland has been elected as Convener of the committee with Marco Gaudoin as the Clerk. The committee has produced a parish profile (which you can find on the website and will be used for individuals seeking information on our parish) and our vacancy is now being shown on the Church of Scotland vacant charge database. We would also welcome any personal recommendations of ministers known to our congregation, - so please contact Garry or Marco if this is the case. In addition, we have received the 'go ahead' to start recruiting a new Church and Community outreach worker.

George Galloway has intimated that after 40 years' service on the Property Committee, he wishes to 'retire'. What an amazing service George has provided to our church community over many years but he has assured me that he and Margaret will still be around to advise as we move forward. Thank you George. I am delighted to inform you that Carole Mackie has very kindly agreed to take on the role as Property Convener.

Looking forward, I am pleased that we managed to 'engineer' a mini-plant sale. Thanks must go to Stuart Hislop and his team of volunteers who pulled it all together, including all the Covid-19 compliance aspects. A super opportunity to re-start our church life.

# The General Assembly 2021

The Church of Scotland General Assembly for 2021 will be held online for a second year. It will open on Saturday 22nd May at 10:00am, with a morning session that will include the installation of the Moderator, followed by an afternoon session at 1:00pm. Business sessions from the following Monday to Thursday will be across two afternoon sessions, at 1:00pm and 4:00pm.

The proceedings will be live streamed and available for everyone to watch on the Church of Scotland website, www.churchofscotland.org.uk/ga, where you can also read the General Assembly Reports and publications, usually referred to as "The Blue Book". Prince William, Duke of Cambridge, has been appointed the Lord High Commissioner to the 2021 General Assembly.

Of course, preparations for this event have been in place for some time. The Interim Presbytery Clerk for Glasgow Presbytery, Rev. Dr. Grant Barclay, has given guidance on what Commissioners might expect and further training days have been arranged to explain the "Assembly Hub", which will be the means by which Commissioners can contribute to the various debates. We are told that there will be an unseen army of helpers to assist with the technology, and that in this instance, two screens are definitely better than one. Rumours that there have been experiments with a foot stomping sound effect in the event of a majority vote are probably without foundation.

No communal singing will be a sad loss for many, but we are promised personally focussed worship and encouraged to play our part in determining the future of the Church in Scotland.

Current COVID rules meant that the procedure was a bit

different from normal. As Tom said as he was about to perform the baptism ceremony: "At this stage I would normally be doing some weightlifting..." (Freddie takes after his big brothers, George and Alexander, whose chunky build Tom experienced when he baptised them!) The remaining customers were silent and motionless. They knew my father and were certain that whatever he was about to do would be more entertaining than whatever they could see in the cinema or on the telly.

From the back we heard metal trays being dropped and cries of anguish, while in front of everyone the normally composed Mr. Jackson was getting redder and redder in the face. He opened his mouth to address my mother when Dad came bouncing back into the front shop with a smile as beatific as it was false on his face and said, "Everything is under control. We will be there shortly."

Mr. Jackson gave him a relieved smile, glanced around at all the curious onlookers and made a hasty departure. Again we were all asking what was going on?

Dad sprang into action like a Glaswegian Basil Fawlty and began pushing reluctant customers out the door. When the doors were closed and locked then dad looked pleadingly at my mum. "Monica! Last week. Mrs Murray. The president of the Guild."

We all nodded, wondering where this was leading to.

As the others were gathering up the ingredients I ran to the hook where the tearoom keys were held. Dad was in the back with Cathy; they were both holding on to a corner of a box of cakes, trying to tug it out of each other's grips.

Dad was saying, while pulling at the box, "I am your boss and I want those cakes!"

"Oh, no you don't," Cathy snapped. "When I bought those cakes I was a customer. They're mine, Robert!"

Cathy, though, could be just as stubborn as my dad. She came from Islay, was in her late forties had never set foot on English soil as a matter of principal. She was a hoot.

I left them to it, arguing back and forth as they clutched onto their part of the box, reasoning that my mother would sort them out. I ran up to the tearoom and started emptying drawers and cupboards of every knife, cutting board and utensil I could find. Once everyone was gathered in the tearoom, in good assembly style fashion we made up the sandwiches, placing them on doily covered trays covered in cling film, followed by the cakes.

We all helped Dad load the Morris Minor shooting brake. Doors shut.

Dad looked at us expectantly. "Who is coming with me?"

In unison we all said, "Oh, no. You are on your own."

We were still embarrassed and decided that he could be the one to explain to the Guild Ladies why their supper was so late.

Should you wish to contact the minister please call or email the office. Our Administrator Janis is able to access messages and calls remotely.


