MESSAGE FROM THE TREASURER

I thought I would give you a quick update on the church finances for the current year given that we are all living in unusual circumstances. I reported to the Kirk Session recently that while our income had fallen by around 14% in the year to date, our expenditure was also reduced through savings on heating and general occupation costs of the church building. The main shortfall in income is from the freewill and open plate donations and a reduced income generated from the use of the halls. I am forecasting that there will be a deficit for the full year because there are some backlog maintenance costs still to incur on both the church and the Manse. All said and done however, I believe we are in a good position relative to other churches and I am comfortable with the financial position at SMPC despite the impact of COVID-19.

I would really like to thank everyone who has continued to donate regularly and generously by standing order as it is these donations which have been instrumental in maintaining our healthy financial position.

I have been asked by some who donate by envelope and plate if it is possible to make donations online and I am pleased to see that the Church of Scotland in Edinburgh ("121") has set up an online donation facility for this purpose. Donations can be made by this method and they can be directed towards individual congregations. You can do this by accessing the following page:

https:/www.churchofscotland.org.uk/donate and by clicking on the "Donate" button at the top right of the page. Then click on the Donate to a Congregation button and type in the name "Glasgow Sherbrooke". The process will take you through some personal details and then on to a PayPal donation page and it is easy to follow the instructions from there. Any amounts donated in this way will be passed on to us by 121 along with your details in order that any Gift Aid can be reclaimed.

The Church of Scotland have also confirmed that anyone who gives weekly by freewill envelope can make a single "catch-up" donation if they wish by sending it in only one envelope. Please mark on the envelope the words "Small Donations" and include your name and we will then allocate that donation over the number of weeks that it represents.

I hope to see you all at some time when things get back to "normal".

Presbytery met by Zoom on the 10th of November.

The Moderator opened the meeting with prayer & a scripture reading - Philippians 2 v1-11.

There were tributes to Rev. William Alston, Rev. James Ross & Stuart Bruce (Additional Elder)

Much of the business was fast tracked, but first of all we were moved into Breakout Rooms. This proved to be a small group, where about seven of us met & introduced ourselves, which churches we belonged to & a little bit about our situation at the moment. Some were experiencing a vacancy or union & some had only recently had their churches re-opened for worship. We were also asked to mention a subject requiring prayer for our congregation.

New Presbytery Elders were welcomed & the representatives of the congregations cited to attend.

Congregations were thanked for their responses to the LCR questionnaire describing their situation through Lockdown & it was stated that there were 5 congregations whose returns were overdue.

It was noted that there was considerable interaction with the "Press Pause Resource" which is still on the Presbytery website.

The World Mission Committee thanks those congregations & individuals who supported the appeal for Kunri Christian Hospital in the Diocese of Hyderabad. £1686 was raised & this will be sent via Faith Impact Forum. It was noted that the Diocese of Hyderabad was celebrating its Golden Jubilee. A presentation was given regarding the schooling in the area.

"Glasgow Churches Together" are organising a celebration jointly for St. Andrew & St. Margaret on the afternoon of Sunday 22nd of November. The Blessing of the Crib in George Square will take place on Wednesday 2nd December.

There is no anxiety though because I hand my day over to God every morning, read Tom's 'Thought for the Day', the Bible passage and I know for sure that God is with me in everything I do. He doesn't promise we won't have troubles but he does assure us, that he will be there to carry us through them. We will see Covid end at some point but until then I am content and at peace.


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
